

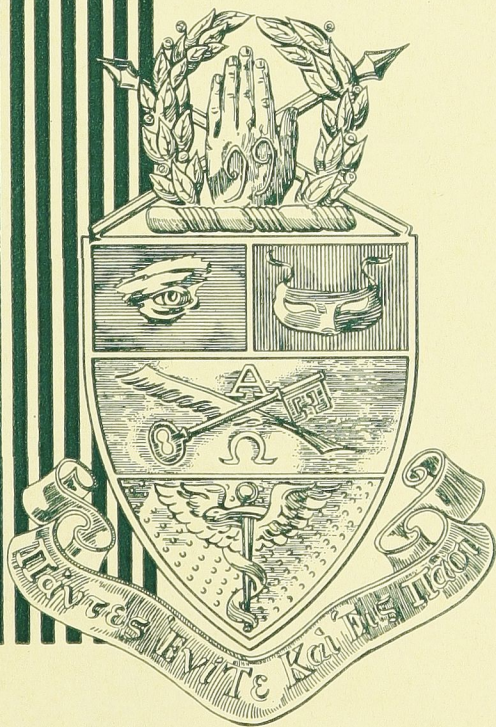

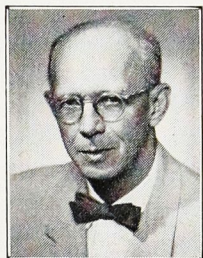

I was caught napping on this assignment and as usual the reaction was an effort to transpose my embarrassment into irritation at some one or some thing. As a result I came up with a most malicious idea. I thought I would start this with some utterly preposterous statement to determine how many Kappa Psi men read *THE MASK*. Saner judgment persuaded me that this would be a personal mistake because I am sure that a lot of them read *THE MASK* but not the crumbs that fall from the desk of the present Grand Regent.

Since this is a closed season, during which most students are protected against pedagogical sniping it would probably be wise to promote popularity by being pleasant. No hip-shooting. Unfortunately the preceding does not promote progress.

Ours is a farflung and tremendously variegated organization. I think I am correct in assuming that it is fortunate that our future lies in the hands of these many, many different individuals and influences, rather than in the hands of a few people. Not me, not you but we. If this is a correct assumption our future depends upon one simple thing. That all of us—Alpha to Omega spend a little time thinking about our problems and communicate their thoughts.

When I infer that we have problems I do not mean that we are falling apart at the seams—we all know better than that. However if we persistently neglect our problems this may happen. There is no organization—civil, economic or religious which is not in this position. Worse, most of the problems which we all must face are not simple problems for which there is a single simple answer.

With all sincerity I will say that, thanks to the contributions and thought of thousands of Kappa Psi men we are a fine, sound organization. I am sure that we will continue in this tradition and I hope that we will become better. However neither of these in any sense of the word—automatic. All types of competition, both external and internal are becoming increasingly keen. Certainly we can not expect our external competition to sit down and wait for us. Equally certainly our personal urgencies, demands upon our strength and time and our patience are not going to lessen. We must be bigger than all of these factors.

I think that there are three, major and very closely related problems. (1) Economic. We must place ourselves in a position to do what needs to be done. (2) Communication. To be in a position to continually and effectively inform every Kappa Psi man as to what is going on and as to what should be going on. (3) Planning. This has to be a daily project. It cannot be solved adequately at Biennial Conventions.

In this blurb I only intend to comment nonspecifically as to what I think should be done in these three areas. Later I will be more specific.

The Fraternity System*

Bishop Stephen F. Bayne of Seattle in a recent Founders' Day address had the following to say:

"The fraternity system is an unique American institution. Other countries throughout the world do not have anything which corresponds to it. It developed here not through efforts of colleges to establish it, or by the government, or by any outside agency or body, but through groups of young men desiring a fraternal relationship." . . .

"We hear the fraternity system attacked because much of it is archaic, because it is discriminatory—and I do not deny that this may be true—but those who attack either do not understand, or they misunderstand, the real meaning and worth of the fraternity system. If fraternities did not have something fundamentally good at their depths, they would not long remain alive. Never be ashamed that you are a fraternity man."

If I Went to College Again*

Reverend George G. Parker of the Congregational Church at Manhasset, New York in a recent sermon lists the following items which he would hope to acquire if he returned to college again:

"First, I wish someone would remind me that *College is life, too.*

"Second, if I went to college again, *I hope someone would remind me to live on a high, moral plane.*

"Third, if I went to college again, *I wish someone would remind me that there is a 'will-to-believe' and a 'will-to-disbelieve.'*

"Fourth, if I were going to college again, *I wish someone would say while in college, 'lift your religious faith to a mature level.'*

"Fifth, if I went to college again, *'I would want at once to tackle some of the world's basic problems.'* What are the basic problems? Here is one— *'The people of the world learning to live together.'*"

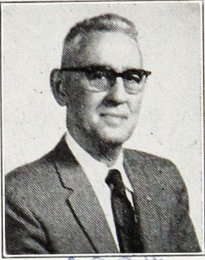

THE GRAND SECRETARY-TREASURER HAS THIS TO SAY

ABOUT A NEW ERA IN PHARMACY . . .



Although a number of schools of pharmacy have had for some time, educational programs extending beyond the regular four years of college, this September will find all recognized schools offering as a minimum requirement for a degree in pharmacy, a five year program of education.

To some individuals with a special interest in pharmacy fraternities, this is a matter of some concern. They feel that during the preprofessional period when most potential pharmacy students are enrolled in colleges of liberal arts, the social fraternities will attract them before they are acquainted with the pharmacy fraternities and thus deprive

the pharmacy fraternities of substantial numbers of members. Professional fraternities in medical, dental and law schools have had to contend with this same situation for some years. If we note the present large number of national fraternities with their substantial memberships in the professional categories just mentioned, it would seem that the social fraternities have not affected materially the membership of these professional fraternities and the same should hold true for the pharmacy fraternities after a period of adjustment which may require several years.

For some years there has been a wide variety of conditions affecting the groups of students from which pharmacy fraternities select their members. These conditions range from those found in the individual school such as the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science where there is no competition by social fraternities, to the large campus universities where Kappa Psi has had to compete with the social fraternities for some years. That our Kappa Psi chapters have been able to attract their share of excellent members and develop strong organizations in large campus universities is well demonstrated in many schools with excellent examples on the strong fraternity campuses at the University of Connecticut, University of North Carolina, North Dakota Agricultural College, and the University of Texas.

With the introduction of the extended program of pharmaceutical education in many schools, there is likely to be some reduction in the overall national membership. To overcome this, some persons have suggested that we encourage and permit the pledging of prepharmacy students. As a general policy this is certainly unwise and in many schools will be impracticable. Until a student has definitely decided on pharmacy as his objective and has demonstrated a satisfactory quality of scholarship, we should not be too concerned about his becoming a member of a pharmacy fraternity. Also, the records show that many pharmacy students are not initiated into Kappa Psi Fraternity until late in the sophomore year or early junior year. The pledging of prepharmacy students will not interest this group. In schools where freshman students have been pledged and initiated as members of Kappa Psi Fraternity and where the preprofessional education will now be given in a lower division of the pharmacy school during the first and possibly the second year, the question arises as to when pledging will be permitted. At this time we can inform you that Kappa Psi Fraternity does not have a fixed policy since the national officers believe that it is best to meet conditions as they arise.

Any chapter which believes that it has a problem or anticipates problems arising as a result of the extended program of pharmaceutical education should write to the Central Office for advice. In many instances we believe that the ingenuity and the intense loyalty of our Kappa Psi members plus the sound advice of the Grand Council Deputies, will make it possible to solve most local problems and make proper adjustments without too

much difficulty, but your national officers are always ready to help when called on for advice.

Greek Letter Designations in Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity

On various occasions, the rather inconsistent manner in which Greek letters have been assigned to chapters in Kappa Psi Fraternity has been questioned.

In order to understand this matter in part, one must note that Kappa Psi has enjoyed a rather unique history. First it existed as a fraternity in preparatory schools and later it became a fraternity for members of the medical and pharmaceutical professions. Since 1924 it has been strictly a pharmaceutical fraternity.

In the customary manner, Greek letters were assigned to the chapters as a means of identification. Previous to 1924, which was during the medical-pharmacy organization of Kappa Psi, there was no segregation of chapters and Greek letters were assigned in an orderly manner. When the two professions separated by mutual agreement in 1924, some of the Greek letters that designated chapters of Kappa Psi that were in medical schools were then available for new chapters as they were chartered in pharmacy schools. Thus as one reviews the records he will find a number of instances where single Greek letters or combinations of them were assigned to two different chapters and in some instances with only a brief interval between the changes. This frequently causes confusion and it also accounts for some of the apparent errors that we find in the records.

It is a fact that since 1924, for some unexplained reason, several chapters were assigned Greek letter designations in a haphazard manner. In recent years the unassigned Greek letters have been used in proper sequence except that all Greek letters formerly assigned to chapters that have been discontinued (where schools have been discontinued) or are dormant, are not reassigned to new chapters.

The following list shows how Greek letters have been assigned to Kappa Psi Chapters in schools and colleges of pharmacy:

APhA Publishes New Drug Name Lexicon

The American Pharmaceutical Association has announced the publication of *Proprietary Names of Official Drugs*, a 48-page, easy-to-use pamphlet to fill the need for an authoritative, handy reference source to identify drugs official in the 1960 revisions of the USP and NF by their proprietary or other trade names.

In making the announcement, APhA Secretary William S. Apple noted that "the astounding total of 373 of the newest, most widely used and proven effective therapeutic agents are included in USP XVI and NF XI. Added to the many other important agents which are being carried forward from the previous editions, this can only mean that the pharmacist, more than ever before, will be consulted as to which drug brand names correspond to which nonproprietary names, and conversely which official names apply to which trade names."

Dr. Apple continued by observing that "as the recognized local authority on drug nomenclature, every pharmacist can expect that physicians, dentists, nurses, and others active in the health field will come more and more to rely upon him to provide factual, up-to-date information on new drugs. In anticipation of this need, the American Pharmaceutical Association has published *Proprietary Names of Official Drugs*. This is the second edition of the pamphlet formerly known as Manual 102.

Every member of the American Pharmaceutical Association will receive by mail a complimentary copy of this new comprehensive drug name lexicon. For others, single copies are available at 25 cents per copy. How Can Kappa Psi Chapters Serve Their Communities Most Effectively?*

Kappa Psi as a professional fraternity draws its membership only from those persons who are planning to enter the field of Pharmacy. By virtue of their profession and their membership in Kappa Psi, the brothers of Kappa Psi are united in a bond the rival of which can not be found in any other organization. Because of this bond, Kappa Psi brothers should have more than a common interest in the projects, drives, and organizations which deal directly with, or are related to the health professions. These projects should be of paramount importance to the student-pharmacist, and he should consider it his professional duty to actively participate in them. Every active chapter should have incorporated within their planned events for the year, a program of aid or service to the community.

It is realized that there are many limitations imposed on such a program. The major limitations that the chapters must contend with are money, time, and manpower. Finances are limited to dues and occasional assessments, and usually do not warrant the adoption of a program that would be costly to the chapter. In many instances there is a limitation in the amount of time or manpower that can be utilized in supporting such a program due to conflicts of an academic, employment, or social nature. These limitations, however, should not prohibit the individual chapters from participating in such a program.

Many times during the year an opportunity to serve the community presents itself in the form of donated manpower to the student health program. Often vaccines and inoculations are offered to the students in an attempt to ward off a coming epidemic. In most instances a large number of technically qualified personnel are needed to aid in giving these inoculations. There could be no more professional way in which the chapter could serve their community.

Another method by which Kappa Psi Chapters could serve their communities is to donate their time and knowledge to a first-aid and civil defense training program. In every community there are constant opportunities present to speak on various phases of first-aid and civil defense training to different groups and organizations. Most of these organizations would welcome an opportunity to have a well informed person speak on a subject that is of vital importance to all of us.

In many small communities a poison control center has not been initiated. The initiation of such a program would certainly be of benefit to the community and comes under the auspices of what Pharmacy normally embraces. In larger cities where there are poison control centers in effect, the chapters could donate their time and effort where it is needed. Personnel can always be utilized in such programs to scan the literature and to keep all references up to date.

Another project could be the visiting of shut-ins and hospital patients who seldom receive visitors. Both mental institutions and children's clinics can use these services. Reading of newspapers or books to elderly or incapacitated persons would certainly brighten their lives. Many of these people would probably enjoy just talking to a young person.

There are also many projects that can be initiated that will be of aid to the pharmaceutical community and indirectly to the community in general. After graduation it is easy for a pharmacist to lose contact with many of his sources of information. The publishing of a news bulletin discussing current problems on a national and local level would probably be more helpful to men in the field. A prime example of this could be done with the

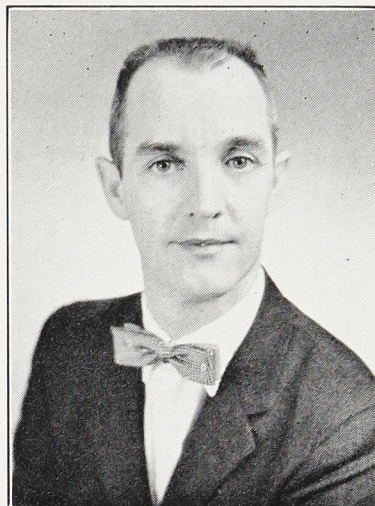

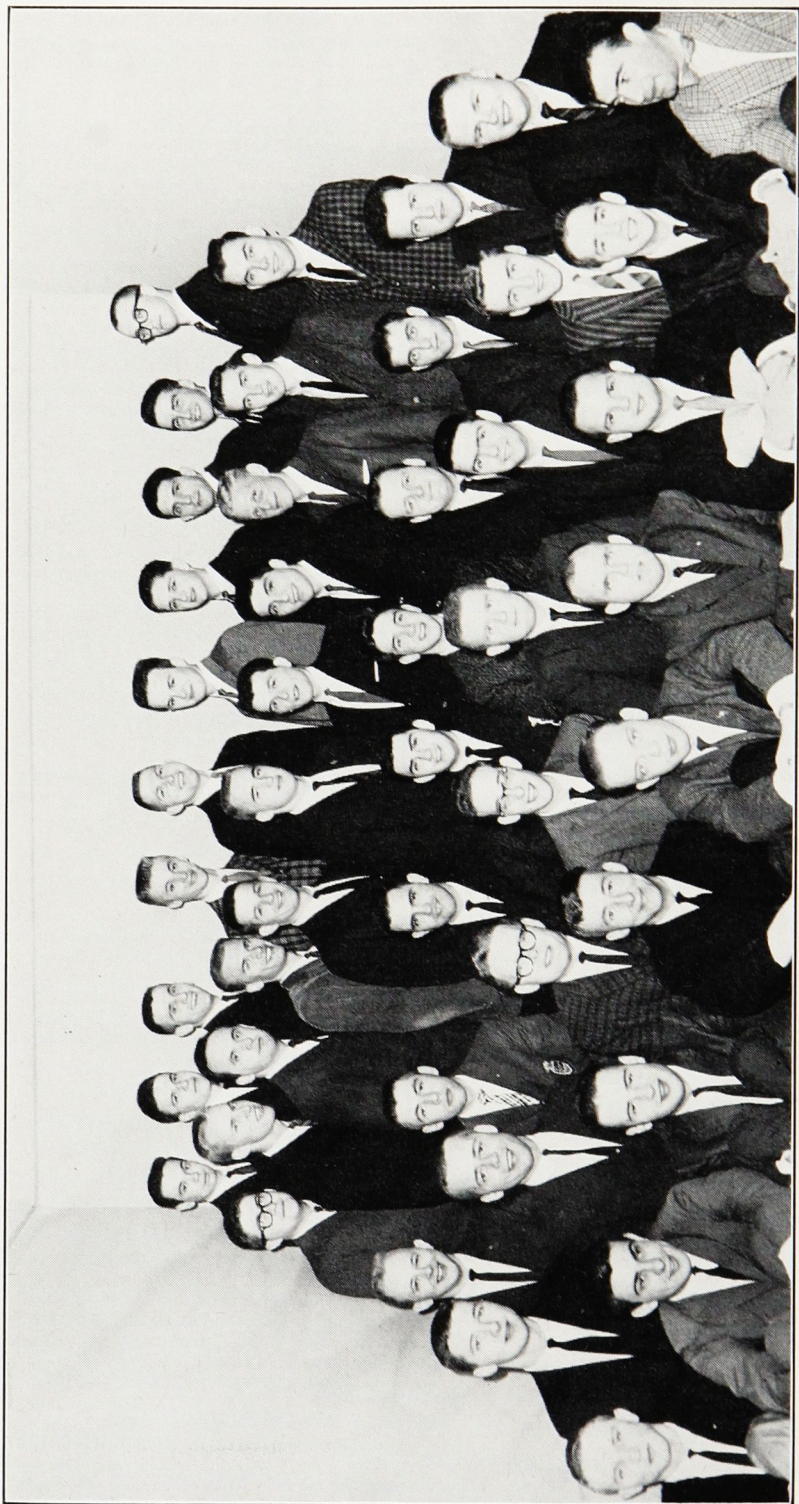

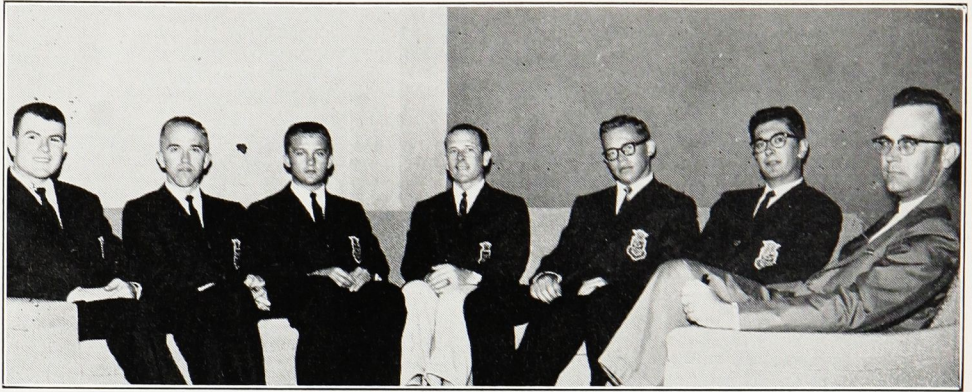

present investigations taking place in Washington. Large amounts of information could be gathered, scanned, and the more important data reprinted and disseminated to the pharmacists in the field. This would not necessarily have to be done on a continual basis, but only when the need presents itself such as in court cases, drug suits, and revision of laws.

It is common practice for many high schools to conduct career days when their students visit the colleges. Many chapters publish pamphlets that contain all the activities of the college for the past year and that are distributed to all the high schools in their region and are given to the graduating seniors to interest them in the profession. Many brothers donate their time during orientation week to serve as counselors.

Each year there is a week set aside as National Pharmacy Week. At this time chapters should take the initiative to focus public attention on the profession of Pharmacy. Few people realize just what Pharmacy embraces and what services are offered or can be offered by the pharmacist. These services should be brought to the attention of the public so that they can better use and appreciate them.

There have been various surveys initiated which are an aid to the pharmacist in conducting his business more effectively. These surveys could be conducted by Kappa Psi members on a continual basis. They are of great value to the pharmacists individually and to the whole pharmaceutical industry.

All of these have been projects whereby Kappa Psi Chapters could serve their communities more effectively. The adoption of a project which would serve their community most effectively is difficult to ascertain. Any of these projects could be and would be of immense value to the community if every member of the chapter took a personal interest in the project. Any project of this nature, undertaken by the whole group in which everyone is doing his part, will be a true representation of the whole and serve as a common bond between the members, and would be of untold value to the community.

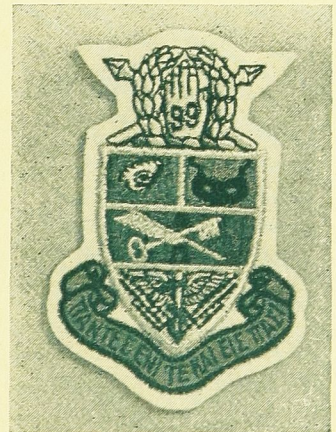
