

From the Grand Regent

Province Realignment

At the 42nd Grand Council Convention, I established a Task Force to review the present alignment of our chapters in Provinces and to make a recommendation to the Executive Committee on their findings. At the Executive Committee meeting held in Houston in July, we received a report from the Task Force and now have a suggested format for realignment of Provinces. This suggested change will be sent to all graduate and collegiate chapters for discussion after which an open hearing is scheduled during the 43rd Grand Council Convention in Orlando. Why realignment? Why not? Many times we hear the expression, "If it is not broke, don't fix it." Sometimes this leads to stagnation, a lack of imagination, and creeping provincialism.

As Grand Regent of the fraternity it is my duty to strengthen the fraternity, to make its operations more fluid, and to seek what is best for the whole and not for a few. During my tenure as Grand Regent I have had the opportunity to visit Chapters throughout the United States. I have observed our areas of strengths and weaknesses and have

noted imbalances in Province size and strength. One must step beyond what may be politically feasible and begin to look at what is best for Kappa Psi.

Change is always difficult. We may see certain chapters moved to another province but it should not mean the loss of friendships. Brotherhood transcends province lines. We are all members of the same fraternity today and will be tomorrow. What we decide must be done in good faith and in the spirit of brotherhood.

My final request of each of you is that you review and discuss the realignment. Consider both the positive and negative effects of realignment and have your chapter delegate to the Grand Council prepare to offer your chapters views. I am certain the final decision by the Executive Committee will be one done after careful and thoughtful consideration. You can rest assured your views are important and will be heard and analyzed.

As always, you have my best wishes for a successful academic year.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECEIVES CANCER GRANT



Tom Pento (Gamma Omicron), have an antiestrogen which appears promising, and they have hopes of taking this compound into Phase I testing in late Spring.

How to work with people you don't like

"The customer is always right!" is an easily remembered phrase that you should recall whenever you need to remind yourself of the importance of getting along with other people. Its message can help those people in the business world who actually work with customers, as well as those people who work in other areas. All of us have to work with other people, and therefore we should do all we can to improve our relationships with them.

Your ability to sustain productive relationships with other people, is a critical factor in determining how quickly you reach the goals you have established for yourself. Mastering your ability to develop and sustain productive relationships with people you may not respect or like, is a necessity, since you will find yourself in situations where your effectiveness depends on their co-operation. If you allow a personal dislike for someone to develop into a personality clash, or power struggle, you will be placing yourself in a position where you may end up becoming your own worst enemy. People working in close proximity with either one of you, will quickly sense your hostility to each other, and eventually everyone will became aware of it. Once your mutual dislike for each other is general knowledge; not only will your decisions, opinions and actions be more closely scrutinized, but also, you will have the distinction of having created one additional problem that your superiors must remain aware of.

If you are unfortunate enough to already be caught up in a scenario such as this, do all you can to extricate yourself immediately. Consider mentioning (at a time when you are sure to be overheard by your superiors, but not overheard by the other person involved) that you have come to the realization that you may not have been



doing all you could have to contribute to the smooth, efficient handling of your responsibilities, therefore you have re-prioritized your objectives. Continue on, casually explaining that your primary objective is to establish and maintain the most efficient, productive relationship possible, with everyone you come in contact with. Steps such as these, will improve your working relationship with the other person; should get you more visibility; will demonstrate your commitment to your work, by publicly acknowledging your decline in productivity; and, in the long run, will end up being more valuable to your future promotability. than continuing on with your present self-defeating behavior.

Your success in achieving the objectives that you have established for yourself, or that your employer has established for you, is directly related to how well you are able to get along with the people you come in contact with. Improving relationships often requires that you become aware of when, as well as how to separate your ego and personal emotions from your working relationships with other people. The following suggestions will direct you in establishing and maintaining mutually beneficial, long lasting relationships with other people:

- Be sure that everyone that you come in contact with knows that you value the relationship you have with them;
- Encourage people you are close with professionally, as well as personally, to exchange their thoughts, beliefs and attitudes with you;
- Identify, and remain aware of basic differences between you. When an opportunity arises, discuss these differences—calmly and rationally explain how you feel, and why you feel the way you do. Ask the other person to tell you why they feel as they do. The best time to initiate this discussion is when a situation develops, related to one of your areas of differences but involving someone other than the two of you. By talking about someone else's problem, you are more likely to limit vour discussion to the actual circumstances, without allowing your emotions to interfere. Once you have established this mutual understanding you will find it easier to work around your areas of disagreement.

As you work at developing your skills in this area, focus your efforts on creating an environment where you can concentrate on only the thoughts and activities that will help you to achieve your objectives. When you do encounter people who are difficult for you to work with, remember to recall the phrase, "The customer is always right!". It will remind you of the importance of getting along with other people, and the role they play in your achieving the goals you have established!


