#### SOME MENTAL COBWEBS OF THE GRAND REGENT

By the time this reaches you, snow will have fallen and so will some of you. Providence was divinely wise in refusing to let us see the January picture in July. As a matter of fact foreseeing the future is becoming more difficult each year. Paradoxically it is more important than ever that we try to do so.

We are not unique—only following the general pattern—many new and usually more complex problems each year. I do not feel that this is cause for pessimism about our future. I do believe two things—recognition of these problems and setting up mechanisms for their solution.

One of our big problems is the impact of the five year curriculum. Fortunately one of our nightmares—decreased enrollment—is not nearly as grievous as we had feared. However the new curriculum has created some very serious headaches: prepharmacy pledging, competition from social fraternities, diffusion of interest from sororities (I am as usual being facetious), increased probability of prepharmacy students drifting into other areas, individual economics and probably a dozen other problems which we have not visualized.

We have an even greater number of brow-wrinklers generated by our rapidly changing social picture such as increasing competition from other professional fraternities. In general this should be good for all of us—particularly we in Kappa Psi—if we can prove ourselves competent. We have a bevy of social pressures. A rapidly changing system of values, pressures from independents, pressures from joiners, pressures from purists and pressures from free-wheeling thinkers. Also crude as it is to idealists we have economic pressures. The individual is compelled to give more and more consideration as to where he is going to spend his dollars. We have time and energy pressures. In general any extra curricular activity involves a personal sacrifice.

The problems suggested in the last two paragraphs are not problems of one or two chapters. In a greater or lesser degree they are the problems of all chapters.

I hate to be nasty but if we solve these problems all we are doing is maintaining status quo. In our fast moving philosophy and psychology of life—standing still is suicidal. I would like to list four areas in which we must progress: (1) Since they are increasing each year we need to develop a better mechanism for handling our mechanical problems. Things like getting chapters to remit dues and getting the present Grand Regent to submit articles on time. (2) We need to progressively develop a better and more continuous contact—informative, slave-driver and inspirational—between all of the segments of Kappa Psi. Even at the top—national officers—we need more contacts and a better exchange of information and ideas. (3) We need more and better bridges spanning the chasm between undergraduate and graduate information, interest and participation. While it may be classed as a personal phobia, I feel this is our greatest problem and its solution

### Our Second Scholarship Issue

Within these pages of THE MASK we present the second Scholarship Issue to recognize and honor those of our membership who have attained a high level of scholarship during the past (1959-60) school year.

Much of the credit for this issue goes to Second Grand Vice Regent Glen J. Sperandio, who also is Chairman of the Scholarship Committee. The other two members of this fine Scholarship Committee, Wallace L. Guess of the University of Texas and Varro E. Tyler of the University of Washington have each written an excellent article on scholarship. The Scholarship Committee is to be commended for its contribution to this issue of The Mask.

### Time to Examine Rushing\*

At the time of this writing, we are well past midsummer, and nearing the time of registration for the first semester of the academic year, 1960-61. In many institutions, two things are quite apparent: the "coming crowd" has arrived, and housing has become very scarce on many campuses. This has implications for fraternities.

As housing for undergraduates is filled it becomes a real problem for housing officers to try to find space for all who qualify and who want to come. Fraternities might take the attitude that this is fine—it will mean larger numbers of rushees, and greater opportunity for selectivity. But there is more to the problem. What becomes of the boy or girl who goes through rushing, decides not to pledge, and is then confronted with the problem of trying to find a place to live, when all available space is already taken? This breeds bad public relations for fraternities as well as institutions. Students going through rushing successfully have housing—those who do not pledge face the prospect of not being able to find housing.

It has led to the statement which I have heard several times recently: namely, that the fraternity group is the only one which is not in position to make commitments on housing for new pledges until it is too late. Dormitories make their commitments as early as February in advance of the following September and students signing up for dormitory living are all set at rushing time. The same is true of the private house operator, who makes contracts with students as much as a year in advance. The fraternity or sorority rushing program in September presents the only uncertainty in the college housing field, and it is no wonder in these crowded times that many students simply cannot take a chance on waiting for rushing to pledge and secure housing. They sign up in dorms and private houses and then consider a voluntary deferred rushing program which may or may not be successful.

We think the time has come for fraternities to take a good hard look at rushing programs and get in step with the times. Institutions are issuing permits for students to enter six to twelve months in advance of actual registration. Housing is essential to

# THE GRAND SECRETARY-TREASURER HAS THIS TO SAY

#### ABOUT SEVERAL IMPORTANT FRATERNITY RESPONSIBILITIES . . .

If you read fraternity publications frequently, you are quite familiar with the repeated reference and emphasis that is placed on the responsibilities of the fraternity man. One should not infer that only the fraternity man has obligations but rather that fraternities have long been conscious of the responsibilities of their members and they make a continuous effort to see that they conduct themselves as responsible members of society.

The outstanding fraternity man is a product of wide training in a variety of fundamentals. Although he has to meet rather exacting standards and has many responsibilities as an active collegiate member, his responsibility to scholarship certainly rates major attention.

So far as we know, professional fraternities have always placed emphasis on excellence in scholarship. As early as 1917, Kappa

Psi Fraternity issued its first Grand Council Scholarship Award in the form of a gold key. This award, which has been presented continuously for the last forty-three years, goes to the top honor man in the entire class of graduates in schools where the Fraternity maintains chapters. It is one of the oldest awards of its kind presented by a professional fraternity. In recent years other types of recognition for important scholarship achievements have been established including membership in the Rho Chi Honor Society, Scholarships, Fellowships and our own Scholarship Honors Certificate. The great number of awards and honors that come to Kappa Psi members each year would seem to indicate that they are cognizant of their responsibility to scholarship in many schools and that they are meeting or making every effort to meet this important challenge.

Responsibility to the highest standard of ethics in the class room is certainly closely related to the matter of scholarship. The wide spread publicity that has been given recently to dishonesty in the class room is a blot on our educational system which fraternities should help to remove. Every fraternity chapter should see that its members maintain a reputation for academic honesty and that the chapter takes a positive stand against dishonesty in any form in the examination or other class performance. While it is a fact that the emphasis that has been placed on grades may have encouraged cheating, it is no excuse for individuals to be dishonest.

Pride in one's fraternity and his Alma Mater should be a strong influence in helping him maintain at all times the finest scholarship record of which he is capable. Loyalty to his fraternity brothers demands a sense of moral integrity of the highest order.

#### ABOUT THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF CHAPTER OFFICERS

The booklet, INSTRUCTIONS FOR CHAPTER OFFICERS, which was published several years ago and widely distributed in the Fraternity, was prepared so that chapter officers would be familiar with their duties and various responsibilities and thus manage their chapters in a successful manner. The experience which one enjoys as a chapter officer when he is thoroughly familiar with the duties of the office, can be a valuable asset in later years when he is elected to an important office in his professional association, service club or other community organization. If you are a chapter officer (or an officer of some other student organization) you symbolize Kappa Psi Fraternity by your personal conduct and by the manner in which you conduct the affairs of your office. Therefore, you must do your best at all times.

#### WELCOME TO GAMMA NU CHAPTER AND THE NEW BROTHERS

The affiliation of a new chapter with our long established Kappa Psi family is one of the most enjoyable events in the life of the Fraternity. To the new brothers it must be a thrilling experience because they now have the feeling of belonging—belonging to a splendid national organization which will increase the standing and prestige of each new brother for the remainder of his life. To those who are already members of the Fraternity, the addition of a fine new chapter and many new brothers will add luster to the Fraternity and increase its prestige and potential worth to the profession. We extend a hearty welcome to Gamma Nu Chapter and to each of the new brothers.

offers our greatest potential. (4) All of us need to point toward a broader and more constructive contribution to the Profession of Pharmacy. To accomplish these things will be both difficult and expensive. The increased expense to the individual will mean little or nothing. If every one involved makes a little contribution the time and energy investment will be negligible.

I would like to suggest that you give serious thought to four things which I believe will be effective in the solution of these problems: (1) a fulltime Secretary-Treasurer, (2) a new Agora which will inform us who and where our graduates are, (3) some sort of informative publication to supplement The Mask, and (4) increasing funds for making better and more frequent contacts between officers, between officers and chapters and very possibly between chapters.

These are large issues. They should not be undertaken because of my recommendations.

They should be done or forgotten after all of us have thought them out.


attendance and the activation of the entrance permit. Dormitories and private rooming house operators are in a position to take advantage of this and sign contracts at once with the prospective students, but under September rushing systems, fraternities cannot. It is no wonder that good pledges are being lost, simply because the student feels that he cannot take a chance on going through rushing, perhaps failing to pledge, and then having no place to live.

It appears that the time has come for the adoption of rushing systems which will place the system in step with the advanced issuance of entrance permits, and in competition with dormitories and private rooming house operators who can guarantee housing facilities as soon as the student is admitted.

Some will say—that's easy, simply go to deferred rushing. We are not ready to agree, but believe that systems can be found by which rushing and pledging can be accomplished in time to avoid this uncertainty of waiting for September rushing.

### Prominent Kappa Psi Member Installed as President of the American Pharmaceutical Association

Ronald V. Robertson, a prominent member of Kappa Psi Pharmaceutical Fraternity was installed as president of the American Pharmaceutical Association on August 19, 1960 during the annual meeting in Washington, D.C. Mr. Robertson received his pharmaceutical education at Washington State University, and in 1925 became registered as a pharmacist in the State of Washington.

Brother Robertson, owner and operator of Spokane, Washington's original prescription pharmacy, established June 3, 1910, was born in LaGrande, Oregon, on August 5, 1903. His father before him was a pharmacist and in 1923 purchased the present business. After becoming registered Brother Robertson joined the firm, purchased by his father, where he has practiced for the past thirty-four years. He served for five years as a member of the Washington State Board of Pharmacy, and two terms as a member of the Board of Managers of the Washington State Pharmaceutical Association.

Mr. Robertson has been a member of the A.Ph.A. since 1945 and for the past eight years has been chairman of the Professional Relations Committee of the A.Ph.A. Also during this time he has been a member of the National Pharmacy Committee with the Health Professions.

In 1954-1955 he served as second vice-president of the American Pharmaceutical Association and in 1956-1957 first vice-president. He also has been a member of the Committee on Prescription Tolerances. Mr. Robertson was a delegate to the U.S.P. Convention, and chairman of the Committee on Resolutions.

Brother Robertson is a member and past president of the American College of Apothecaries. He is also a member of Kappa Sigma, Rho Chi, Phi Kappa Phi, and is a past president of the Spokane Kiwanis Club and Spokane Retail Trade Bureau.

### Scholarship is a Pattern for Living

Some years ago I chanced to hear a broadcast by Gabriel Heatter in which he quoted some figures proving that the divorce rate among university professors was by far lowest of any occupational group. Mr. Heatter did some speculating on the reason for this and concluded that "these wise and understanding men did not expect too much of their marriage partners." Now I do not know if this statement is factual, but I suspect that it is, even though I have never bothered to verify it. Nevertheless, I have often thought about it as a generality and long ago came to realize the importance of it.

Let me reword Mr. Heatter's statement, putting it in broader terms. Educated persons are happy because they do not expect too much from life. The truth of this axiom is apparent, but the approach is a negative one. Certainly there is more to be gained from an education, or, put in other terms, from a scholarly approach to life than merely the absence of excessive expectations.

Here again the point is best proved by an example from real life. Recall the story of that marvelous lady, Dr. Edith Bone, who during the brief Hungarian revolt was restored to freedom after seven years of solitary confinement in a small, practically unfurnished cell. For more than two years of this time she had absolutely nothing to do, nothing to read, and no human being with whom to speak. Yet she retained her sanity by the use of mental exercises which were dependent to a large extent upon her splendid education in foreign languages. Her scholarly training permitted her to compile mental word lists of her vocabulary in various languages, which together with similar activities occupied her time sufficiently to prevent loss of reason.

This, of course, is an extreme example, and it is hoped that situations of this sort will cease to exist in the civilized world. But it is a vivid illustration of the fruits of scholarship. The uses to which you and I may put our education are certainly more mundane, varying from the thrill of recognition of a beautiful wildflower, to the appreciation of good literature or music, to the sense of pride in compounding some particularly difficult prescription which we know will benefit the health of a friend and neighbor in our community.

These are the intangible, positive benefits of scholarship which cannot be measured in terms of money or other material things, but only in the personal satisfaction which they bring to the individual. They result from scholarly application at all levels of education. Whether it is the fourth grader who takes pride in his ability to spell *peninsula*, the high school student who rejoices in his understanding of the binomial theorem, or the college student who celebrates his mastery of the intricacies of the Embden-Meherhof scheme of fermentation, the resulting satisfaction is the same.

There is no royal road to learning, and the attainment of this type of satisfaction calls for all the work and sacrifice that is necessary for the achievement of any worthwhile objective. True scholarship is one of the few commodities in our civilization that can never be purchased, borrowed, or stolen; rather, it must be earned. But if this price is high, the benefits which it brings are even higher. Nothing else contributes so much to making life worth living.

### The Art of Being a Good Scholar

A scholar may be defined as "one who by long-continued systematic study has gained a competent mastery of one or more of the academic studies." Within this definition lies the secret of being a good scholar—systematic study; but before one can develop good systematic study habits he must first learn HOW to study. In reality then, the attainment of the final goal of being a good scholar is dependent on the mastery of learning HOW to study and developing SYSTEMATIC study habits. Since both of these requisites are essential to good scholarship, it follows that one is practically useless without the other.

Each individual must learn, by trial and error, the best method for him to study. One should not presume to indicate that the best method of study is to follow someone elses routine just because that person may earn good grades. Don't be afraid to experiment with various study techniques until one is found that seems to make studying easy, interesting and informative. It usually takes time to find the method of study that is most adaptable to one's own characteristics, but a serious search for an individual technique is always very rewarding.

Once the student has learned HOW to study, his goal of good scholarship is within easy grasp, yet it may be very elusive unless he also develops a regular, systematic habit of study. All people, not just students, tend to procrastinate. But procrastination, no matter for what reason, is the primary obstacle to systematic study. Most students soon discover that is it almost impossible to catch up in their work once they get behind, and then their studying is pitched toward passing the next exam—not toward the true learning process. The method of systematic studying of all subjects on a regular schedule allows the student time to think about the material under consideration. Then, not only are facts learned but they begin to be correlated and organized in the student's mind. The true learning process thus goes beyond the mere memorization of a group of facts but also encompasses the ability to apply known facts to a new situation in order to arrive at a logical solution.

The amount of time required to study a given amount of material will vary with interest and the individual. However, the student should find that as he masters the art of studying, the time required to gain a competent mastery of the subject should decrease. In most cases then, the student will find himself studying many hours during his first years at college, but soon he discovers that as his study time shortens, his free time lengthens and in his later years at college, he is entering more into "college life."

It should be sufficient to say that if a student is really serious about his education, he will search for a method of study that will allow him to accomplish his aims. Certainly, the shortest route to this goal would be the most pleasant, and experience has shown that systematic study habits pave the way to good scholarship. Since most educational processes do not stop with graduation, good study habits will carry over into the life's work and aid in the attainment of success. Some simple words of advice to the students would be:

1. Learn *How* to study. 2. Develop *Systematic* study habits. Success will surely be yours!







### The School of Pharmacy, College of the Pacific

Under encouragement by the Northern California Pharmaceutical Association, the School of Pharmacy was organized in February, 1955, and began formal instruction in September, 1955.

During the first year of instruction there were about eighty students enrolled in the School of Pharmacy. After five years, the enrollment has increased to over two-hundred students.

The curriculum in the School of Pharmacy is formulated to provide collegiate education and professional training designed to prepare the graduate pharmacist for the practice of the profession on a high level. It is likewise designed to provide related courses to assist the student in gaining a solid understanding of the culture and problems of our civilization. Free electives are provided in order that the student may augment the professional training with considerable general education. Pharmacy electives are also provided for those who wish to strengthen the professional program to better prepare for retail pharmacy, hospital pharmacy, and graduate studies.

### Gamma Nu Chapter Makes Good Start in Scholarship Recognition Program

Father Time is responsible for the fact that our newest chapter does not have a Grand Council Scholarship Key winner for this year. Actually, a member of Gamma Pi graduated from College of the Pacific in June with the highest average in his class; but he

beginning of this new organization. # Mosaic Wall Mural to be Exhibited at Next A.Ph.A. Convention in Chicago

The big news at Gamma Theta Chapter at the University of Kansas in Kansas City is that of the mosaic wall mural depicting the Shield of Kappa Psi which represents the work and gift of Brother Richard Kennett who spent over 200 hours cutting, piecing and gluing the ceramic tile. The mosaic mural, which measures  $52'' \times 32''$ , having shades of red, blue, yellow and black on a white background hangs in the hall of the School of Pharmacy. Working in white tile, Kennett used a straight mechanical effect at the bottom but as you look up from bottom to top there is a growing effect. As the size of the tile becomes larger, the pattern becomes more irregular so as to give a flaring effect around the wreath at top. The artistic techniques that Brother Kennett used on this has won him acclaim from professional Kansas City artists and an article in the Kansas City Star.

The mosaic will be on exhibition in Chicago in April at the next A.Ph.A. convention.





### Death Claims Dr. Henry J. Goeckel, Dr. George Urdang and Dr. Sigurdur Jonsson

Three well-known members of Kappa Psi have been claimed by death recently. They are Dr. Henry J. Goeckel, Dr. George Urdang and Dr. Sigurdur Jonsson.

Dr. Goeckel, who was 76 years old, was probably the oldest living active member of Kappa Psi at the time of his death. He was a Charter Member of Gamma Chapter (1898) and for many years prior to death was active in both the New York and New Jersey Graduate Chapters. Dr. Goeckel was a graduate of the New York College of Pharmacy, now a part of Columbia University. He received a Ph.D. degree after study at the New York Postgraduate Medical School and the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia. He established the Goeckel Laboratory in New York in 1909 and moved it to Cranford, N.J. in 1916. The laboratory was for the examination of food, chemicals and drugs and for clinical, bacteriological and pathological examinations. Dr. Goeckel, a former instructor in analytical inorganic chemistry at New York University, had been with the New York State Board of Pharmacy. In World War I, he was a captain in the Army Chemical Warfare Service.

Dr. George Urdang was made an Honorary Member of Kappa Psi in 1951 while a professor at the University of Wisconsin and director of the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy.

Dr. Sigurdur Jonsson, professor of pharmaceutical chemistry at University of North Carolina died almost instantly in the early morning of July 16, 1960 when his car left the road about eight miles from Chapel Hill. He was alone in a new compact car purchased only a week earlier. He was born January 27, 1919 at Flatey, Iceland and was a naturalized American citizen. Dr. Jonsson was initiated into Kappa Psi by Beta Xi Chapter as a Facultate Member on November 14, 1956.


